

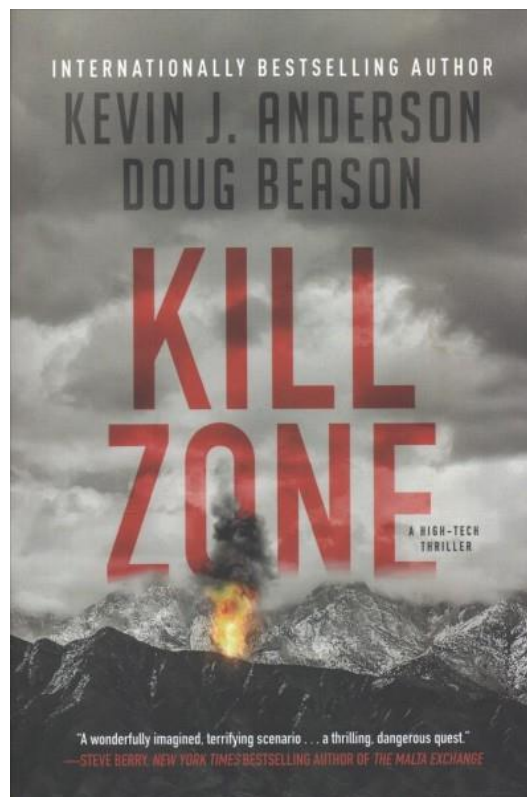

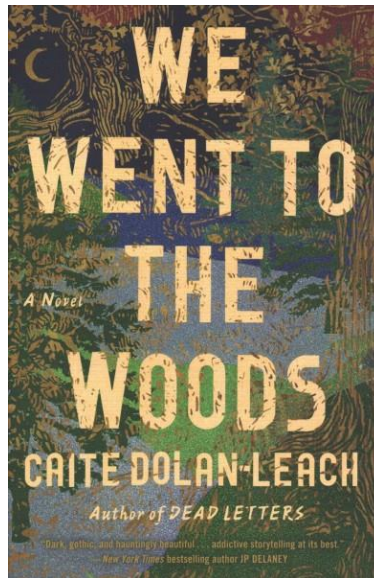

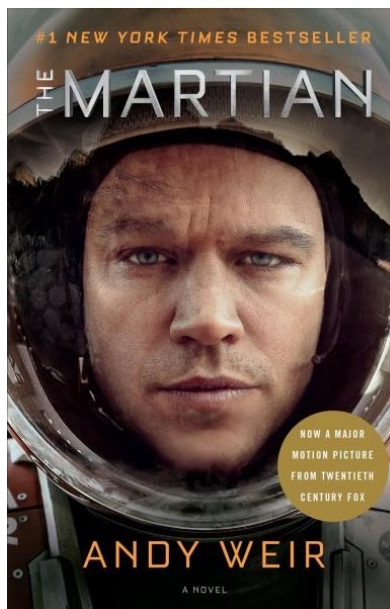
We Went to the Woods

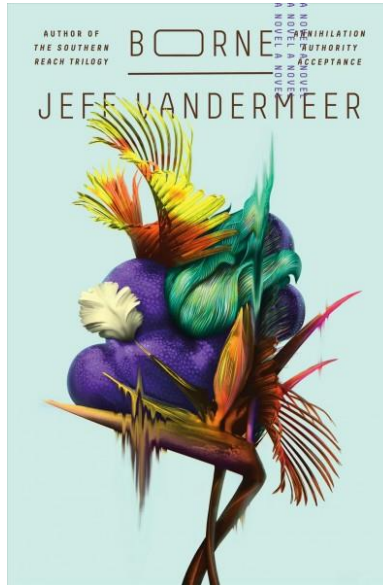
The Martian
